Performance Snapshot

Bible Knowledge Exam performance improved from 86.27 (2023–24) to 102.26 (2024–25), consistently outperforming the national average. Spiritual Formation/CSLP results remained at or above 100% good/outstanding ratings across character, skills, and ministry objectives. Program adjustments (essay integration, assignment load review) supported this strong performance trajectory.

Program Improvements & Next Steps

- Maintain current strategy for Bible Knowledge Exam and exam redesign.
- Monitor CSLP essay integration and student feedback.
- Increase Spanish on-ground participation to broaden data representation.
- Continue data-driven review of learning outcomes to ensure consistent excellence.

All program learning outcomes were met or exceeded during the 2024–2025 academic year. Performance in both biblical knowledge and ministry application demonstrates program strength

and effective alignment with institutional goals. Planned actions for the coming year focus on sustaining excellence, expanding participation, and re-examining the review of degree objectives.
